The remaining \$445 was been sent to the 1st Cavalry Division's Scholarship Foundation, as a contribution to that fund in Ron's name. Ron would be proud to know that a deserving young student will benefit from his memory. The 75th RRA had to put the postage on each of the 460 magazines and ship them to me. I have Larry CURTIS send me a full set of address labels and I put one on each magazine. MERCHANDISE UPDATE By John LeBrun

Greetings from the Pacific North West. I hope everyone had a great Christmas and New Years. As the new year progresses we will be adding and deleting a few items from the inventory. Larry Curtis has contracted for more Ranger lapel pins. I haven't a delivery date but they should be here soon. I haven't seen the finished product so am unable to relay how they compare to the other pins. I'm sure they will be better.

Another item will be added; Ranger rings. I have contracted with a supplier in Canada who claims that they will be exact replicates of the original rings that we had. They used mine to copy the design and artwork. I do not have a firm price because of the exchange rate, current price of sterling silver, etc, etc. However, it will be less than \$50.00. They are making 25 rings in standard sizes. We incur a one-time charge to make the mould for the ring, which then becomes our property. I would like to get an idea of how many members would like one and if the need is greater I can order more at a reduced price for the lot.

The listed merchandise items of watches, sweat shirts, windshirts pullover, windshirts convertible, and Polo shirts will probably not be reordered until we sell off some of the stock we currently have on hand. We need to replenish our bank account. A decision will be made at the next ordering time on what sizes to maintain and if in fact some items be discontinued based on past sales. I have mailed all of our orders out using the Postal Service. It appears to be a little cheaper (shipping costs continue to go up) but have had little feed back about timely receipt of the items and the condition they were received in.
