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

It was a direct result of exposure to AO and you will be compensated from the VA. Big deal, thanks a lot.

I now take 5 different kinds of medication for it because of the complications it causes. I think most of us don't like the VA or going to a doctor but the end result is not a good one if you don't. I'm not a real happy "camper" but at least they caught it in time, I hope.

This is Bill now:

I understand that Ron HUNT and Howard SHUTE have the same disease. I am sure there are more. A lot of us were exposed to that stuff.

The most recent, for me, information about AO is that it also causes chronic lymphocytic leukemia (CLL). It is also known that AO causes Hodgkin's Disease and non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. Maybe if we live long enough, the VA will get around to accepting all of this.

Maybe the reason you don't feel too spiffy is not due to being beyond middle age. Get to the local VA hospital and have it checked out.

Another thing that I am hearing is, lost records. Request, or demand, a copy of everything in your file, and keep it. The "we have no record of that" seems to be occurring too often.

And we thought that all we had to worry about while "in country" was pieces of metal flying through the air.

WHY I ATTEND REUNIONS By John LeBrun

I have been asked a number of time why I continue to attend the reunions. Well there are the usual suspect reasons: getting to see long lost friends and meeting new friend. The reunions also give me a bit of time each year to get away from the usual pace of life and for a few weeks each year travel some part of the country and see just how great it is to live were we do. If that wasn't enough there is also something else that provides reason to come as often as I do. I will try and explain what has happened to me at two different reunions.

The first had to do with my photo albums. Every time I attend a reunion I bring along my photo albums and as other members are looking and commenting about the people and places in the photos a number always ask about the photo with purple smoke. My story now. It's a photo taken from a chopper as I was going in to extract a team after a mission. The team had been out for four days and because they had two new team members they decided to give them the opportunity to practise with the M-79. One of the rounds went off close to the team, wounding a member. As the team got on board the wounded ranger collapsed. I could not see any blood and as he started to go into convulsions I frantically searched for the reason why. I finally found a small entry hole in his chest right at his heart. I relayed the information to the pilot and he flew immediately to an Evac hospital were the he went into surgery. We flew off and were told later that this guy died from shrapnel that pierced his heart. What a tragedy, how did the team members feel, the aircraft crew, the hospital workers, etc. How did it effect the rest of their lives? I known how it affected mine. Now I've told this story a number of time. To other ranger members, in high schools when I talk about my Vietnam experience. It's the truth and it had a profound affect on me after my return. As I was telling the

story for the tenth time at a reunion this guy looks me in the eye and says Bullsh-t. It me and I didn't die. Something that I believed for so long, because I had seen it with my own eyes and now greatfully, untrue.

The other incident that I would like to mention happened at the last reunion in Colorado Springs. Craig and I were eating breakfast on the final day when Craig asked me who that Colonel over there was. I told him it was Colonel Booth an "old" commander from the 1/9th. Craig said. John that's the pilot that pulled us out on your first mission. My first mission with the company and there was little question how we all were leaving the site, probably in a body bag. "Insert a war story here". Craig you only seen that guy's face for a few seconds and at that he was wearing a helmet and he was thirty years younger. Craig repeated his assertion: John that was the guy. I couldn't let that go so I went over to Colonel Booth and asked him what he was doing thirty years ago on that date. You could see it in his eyes. It was him. How do you thank a guy who gave you the rest of your life.

There are a lot of reasons why I continue to attend reunions. These are some of mine. I hope every member. at some time, has the opportunity to attend a reunion. The trip reaffirms, for me, the reasons for our service to our country and with a little luck they provide the opportunity to find some answers to some long held beliefs. Take care and if you attend the reunion check out my photo albums.
