SUBJ: SPENDING CAPS PROPOSED BY THREE NEW BILLS

Three new bills have been introduced in the House—H.R. 3800, H.R. 3925, and H.R. 3973, which would impose mandatory and discretionary spending caps and force deep cuts in veterans programs. Such cuts would be devastating to an already overburdened Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) health care system and will impose cuts in compensation for disabled veterans and their survivors--people who have already sacrificed greatly for our nation.

Billions of taxpayer dollars are spent every year on pork barrel projects that are designed to help members get reelected. Such projects should be the target of budget enforcement, not VA programs. Disabled veterans have earned the benefits due to them, and they should not have to compete with pet projects.

Please urge your member of Congress to vote against these bills.

THIS LADY KNOWS AND CARES Vietnam Survivors Day May 7, 2004 Linda Jenness – McClellan, Ph.D.

Thank you South Carolina Combat Veterans Group for inviting me to participate in Vietnam Survivors Day. I am very honored to be here with you.

I would like to talk to the Vietnam Veterans here today for a few minutes about what you have taught me that Survivor Day means, because it is about so much more than just escaping death in Southeast Asia. More than 58,000 troops did not make it home alive, and over the last thirty years, many of you have asked yourselves, "Are they the lucky ones? What if my name was on The Wall? Would I have been better off if I never made it back?"

Most of the generation who served in Vietnam grew up in the wake of World War II. We learned as children that soldiers had earned a special respect. Soldiers were our fathers, our uncles, our neighbors. They were individuals who were appreciated, cared for, and accepted – even though they were "different." Some were quiet and withdrawn; others drank and spent rowdy nights at the Veteran's Club. They jumped too quickly when they were startled. They were always up early, because they didn't sleep well. As children, when we asked these things, we were told in loving and kindly words, "He was in The War."

And so, it was only natural that when you went off to serve your county, you believed that if you returned home, if you fought and you lived, that same appreciation, caring and respect, would be yours.

There were times in Vietnam that you wondered if you would make it back to The World. Your imagination told you that if you did, you could be you again. You could pick life up where it had left off. You could laugh, and dance, and kiss the girls, and it would be better than ever, because when you got back to The World, you would be a soldier returned from War.

And that is how it should have been. That is what should have happened. America should have understood. We should have welcomed you, loved you, and above all, respected you.

In Vietnam you learned, if you saw the sun come up in the morning, you have made it through yesterday. You learned in Vietnam that the only ground you could trust was the ground on which your feet stood that moment. There was no safety, no rest, no peace. Back in The World it was going to be different.

But is wasn't. There was no safety, rest, or peace for the returning Vietnam Veteran, because the stereotype of The Crazy 'Nam Vet made it home before most of you.

The cheers that greeted you when you stepped on the ground of your homeland were not cheers of welcome and joy. They were cries of insult and derision. The cheers were hurtful and alienating.

You traded your uniform at first chance for civilian clothes, many of you told to do so by those military figures still in charge of you lives. You were told, "If anybody asks about your tan, tell them you were on vacation in Hawaii." In other words, you were cued, "There is no Welcome Home for you. Get back to where you came from, and don't say much about where you have been."

For the Vietnam Veteran, the fight for survival did not end when the Freedom Bird touched down Stateside. The Vietnam Veteran made it home only to learn there was another battle to be fought, another battle to be won. Respect, caring and acceptance were not yours – you would have to find and capture them. You quickly realized putting Veteran of Vietnam on a job application was as likely to hurt you as it was to help. There were some employers who welcomed you, but many employers turned you away. You figured this out, and you learned, "Just don't tell anyone."

But your mothers knew, your fathers knew - and even many of them were frightened by the child who came home. The child who hid in his room by day, and chased danger on the streets at night. Danger was your friend. It helped you feel alive.

When you did finally work, you found some balance. "I can work to stay awake, to put something else on my mind, to try to forget. And, I can drink to go to sleep, if even only for an hour or two."

The fortunate among you had wives, wives who anchored themselves to you and anchored you to them, and rode out the storm. The less fortunate found that divorce was an option that would leave him feeling alone for years, perhaps for decades, because the little trust he had in others was shattered when he was left behind by the person who was supposed to love him most.

Your friends from childhood, from high school? They had moved beyond, in some way, some path, you could not see. Ironically, they were growing up, you were just old. Old beyond your years for you had seen too much to ever know innocence again.

What about your buddies from The War? They might have understood. They might have helped you find yourself, and let you do the same for them. But how do you find a guy in some state hundreds of miles away, when all you know of him is "His name was Action – he came from Detroit."

Actually, it was very perceptive, very adaptive, of all of you to figure that Vietnam was a good place to be some other guy. Not Joe, not John, not Willie, but Lucky, Sarge, or Doc. By having another name, you were able to leave someone else's footprints in the Delta, in the mountains and jungles, and up along the DMZ. The price? You could not easily find each other when you returned home. Worse yet, many of you could not "prove" you'd seen combat because when Oklahoma was killed, his name was Oklahoma – and you couldn't identify him on stressor form.

Perhaps the saddest and most deeply troubling reality of the Vietnam Veterans who survived that war is that they couldn't survive the battle that awaited. Statistics tell us that too many Vietnam Veterans took their own lives in the decades following The War.

Today we still see the premature passing of too many Vietnam Vets, for now they are dying quietly from illness related to Agent Orange, and from hearts that can no longer handle the stress of sleepless nights and anxious days.

Yet, still there are Survivors. YOU have survived. And you have created a ceremony, a recognition that you are proud and that you are able to live life on life's terms no matter how much those terms differed from the expectations of the kid who went off to fight for his country.

And so, I welcome you home. Not only because you made it back to The World, because you never were able to come back to the world you left. I welcome you home because you have found new ground under your feet. You have found each other. And in each other, you have found the respect, appreciation, and caring for which you have waited so long.

But more importantly, you have found self-respect, self-love, and the ability to be who you are – a brave, strong, and earnest young man who put his country before himself. You have survived the odds, and have become what you always should have known you were – a Proud Veteran.

I love you all for hanging in there, and for being who you are. I welcome you back to YOUR World.

CHIROPRACTIC CARE BY VA

The Secretary of Veterans Affairs announced that as of the fall of 2004 US Veterans will be able to receive chiropractic care at 26 selected Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) facilities. According to the release, the VA will hire or contract with doctors of chiropractic to provide the care. In consultation with VA primary care providers, doctors of chiropractic will offer patient evaluations and chiropractic care for neuromusculoskeletal conditions.

For those eligible veterans who live in areas distant from these locations, the VA will allow them to receive chiropractic care through VA's outpatient fee-basis program after a referral by their primary care provider and prior authorization by the VA department.

I was talking to a person who works at the local VA hospital. We have two Ivory Tower type hospitals in this area. She said that at least three specialists have left the Ivory Towers and gone to work at the VA hospital in the last year. They all gave the same reason: they were tired of the assembly line, thirty bodies a day type of practice. They all want to care for about thirty patients a week, and get to know them as a person. The VA hospital may not have all the expensive machines, but the doctors feel they are providing better patient care, (holistic medicine). Is this happening at other VA hospitals? Quality vs. quantity.
